




Line dancing will take place in the gym on Wednesdays starting on April 10 from 6:30 PM to 8:00 PM.

bookmarks with him and mentioned to us that we use bookmarks to pause where we are reading or something we want to come back to. I have always thought of our past as bookmarks that we can return to. Sometimes the bookmarks are positive such as the birth of a child or the day we met the love of our life; other times those bookmarks signify pain as they "mark" a moment of grief in our life.

There is a third bookmark though that I have been thinking about. Five years ago was 2019. In that year we were living in western Nebraska. Our two older daughters were in college and our youngest was just finishing her freshman year in high school. In 2019, five years ago, was also a year of uncertainty for The United Methodist Church. In spring of that year, a special session of General Conference met in Saint Louis. I will not be rehashing the votes (I already did so in a sermon called "United? Methodist Church") but the conclusion of that session was a very divided denomination. It was apparent that we were not going to be a united tent with beliefs ranging from conservative to moderate to liberal and spanning 10 million members all over the globe. In 2019 – five years ago – there was a march to the General Conference in 2020 to be held in Minneapolis. There was a hope that we could come up with a church that could stay together but disagree or another plan that would be an amicable divorce. As you might have figured out, the General Conference of 2020 did not happen because of something called COVID!



## It is Lent.



As Christians we celebrate two seasons. Christmas and Lent. Lent being the most important, the time of spiritual preparation before Easter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends 40 days later on Easter (actually 46 days, as Sundays are not included in the count). Lent was intended to be a 40 day time where we set aside a time for reflection on Jesus Christ—to consider his life, death, burial, and resurrection.

In the Bible, the number 40 holds special significance in the measurement of time. During the flood, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights. Moses fasted on the mountain for 40 days and nights before God gave the 10 Commands. The Jewish people spent 40 years in the wilderness after fleeing Egypt, and the prophet Elijah traveled for 40 days and nights to reach the mountain of God in Sinai. Most relevant for us in studying Lent was that the Temptation of Jesus occurred after he spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11).

### It is Lent.

For me that means a time of remembrance, a time where I try and read and reflect on the Easter story every day. For me that means reading and reflecting on the seven last words of Jesus on the cross.

- 1. "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do" (Luke 23:34).
- 2. "You will be with Me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43).
- 3. "Woman, behold your son! ... Behold your mother!" (John 19:26 27).
- 4. "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" (Matthew 27:46).
- 5. "I thirst!" (John 19:28).
- 6. "It is finished!" (John 19:30).
- 7. "Father, into Your hands I commit My spirit" (Luke 23:46).

## It is Lent.

What always strikes me about the last seven words of Christ is that there is no hyperbole, no demands or commands, no regrets or anger, and no preaching. The words reflect no second thoughts, no getting off the cross until the crucifixion was complete, and the sacrifice was made.

Not even for the Son of God. And yet it seems to me that these seven last words are representative of the central values of our faith:

That even in the midst of great injustice, forgiveness is the foundation of the Kingdom of Heaven. That I, we, have never suffered any wrong greater than that suffered by Jesus and that we never have an excuse not to forgive.

That we know we live in a broken world and we long for the day when all will be restored, and paradise will be reality.

That in the end we think about our loved ones, our family, and friends, and even in death, make provision for others.

That Life is hard, sometimes it feels like God is far away, and it is normal to feel forsaken and wonder why.

That Jesus was wholly human, with our same physical needs, and suffered as we suffer, when those needs were not met.

That all things eventually end, death comes to all, and our time should be used wisely so that we can say we accomplished all that we were called to do.

That at the end, we lay down our burdens and trusting in whom we have believed, pass over into the care and arms of a Gracious God.
